SALFORD CENTRAL

Salford Central Church celebrated its Centenary in October and is looking towards the future as it becomes part of a major international charity, Oasis UK.

Oasis was founded in 1985 by Steve Chalke MBE, with the vision to build a hospital, hostel and school. It is now a significant voluntary sector provider, delivering educational, health and housing services. Members past and present joined with local residents for the celebrations. All weekend the church building, one of Salford's major landmarks, hosted an exhibition of memorabilia, from photo's of the first church members, to videos of the Boys' Brigade parades and costumes from annual community festivals.

The church was established as Salford Central Mission. It not only thrived but played a key role at the heart of the local community. In 1937 alone, more than 1000 local people received treatment through its on-site medical facilities whilst more than 1500 benefited from the free legal support it offered. With a five-a-side football pitch, a gym, and a range of other facilities and events on site, it served as a true community hub.

Now, at the start of a second century, under Oasis leadership in partnership with the U R C, the journey towards recapturing the church's role at the hub of the community has begun. This was marked by the opening of the new 'shop front', including what will be known as the Hub Café and a drop-in centre as well as office space.

Rev. Mark Greer, who has recently been appointed by Oasis as church leader, works alongside other team members including Jessie his wife, Brian Leitch and Rev Janet Sutton, who is the U R C minister. "It was great to see reunions of people who hadn't seen each other for more than 50 years," said church leader Mark. "It was a wonderful opportunity to gather together a crowd, the likes of which hasn't been seen at Salford Central for many years, to celebrate the past and look forward to the future. It was a fantastic weekend, during which we made lots of good contacts with members of the wider community."
